Kentucky Farm Bureau 2024 Career Technical Education Awards

The Kentucky Association for Career and Technical Education (KACTE) participates in the Association for Career and Technical Education (ACTE) national awards program to promote excellence in Career and Technical Education. The **Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation** sponsors the annual Career and Technical Education (CTE) Awards, which seek to recognize:

- individuals who have made extraordinary contributions to the field;
- programs that exemplify the highest standards; and
- organizations that have conducted activities to promote and expand Career and Technical Education programs.



KACTE conducts the awards program, which is organized under the guidelines established by ACTE. There are 13 award categories, each with various criteria and eligibility requirements. KACTE members and individual program areas are encouraged to participate each year by submitting nominations to the KACTE Awards Committee chair. The Awards Committee reviews the nominees and selects the winners. Vanessa Ruda Counseling and Career Development Professional Award

Throughout the duration of her 17 year public education career, Dr. Ruda has worked to promote college and career readiness and provide work-based learning opportunities. Over these many years, she has consistently and effectively provided timely information to students about navigating their transition from high school to college or career. She has provided college and career counseling to students and their parents, assisted them with applications for college admissions and jobs, guided them through scholarship applications, and conducted dozens of visits to colleges and universities.

In addition, Dr. Ruda has managed the College and Career Readiness course and its accompanying work-based learning experiences for more than 2,000

students during her tenure at the Jessamine Career Technology Center. Annually, the number of students participating in this work-based learning program has grown from 97 in the 2007-2008 school year, to 259 in 2023-2024. Dr. Ruda obtained her Doctorate of Educational Leadership in 2016, which culminated in her dissertation addressing the impact of Career and Technical Education Student Organizations (CTSOs), gender, parental education level, and socioeconomic position on the Kentucky Occupational Skills Standards Assessment. She is an ardent advocate for CTSOs, and proved through her research they play a statistically significant impact on student achievement.

CAREER AND TECHNICAL NEW TEACHER OF THE YEAR

Catherine Poole has been an agriculture teacher at Franklin-Simpson Middle School for the last four years. Coming in during COVID, she understood the importance of getting students involved. Ms. Poole piloted her FFA chapter in 2020. She empowers students by teaching them to apply theoretical knowledge in practical settings, fostering a deeper understanding of agricultural concepts. By engaging students in community service projects, such as Operation Christmas Child and donation drives for local animal shelters, she works to instill a sense of civic responsibility and encouraged students to make a positive impact beyond the classroom in ways they are passionate.

Ms. Poole has served as the Kentucky Middle School Agriculture Advisory Committee Chair, middle school agriculture professional development facilitator, pre-service teacher agriculture education workshop facilitator, mentor of pre-service teachers, and she led the pilot program for a new middle school agriculture curriculum.

She encourages her students to apply for scholarships and grants available to them through the FFA. By learning how to effectively write and apply for this funding now, these students can use their experience in high school to get scholarships to fund post-secondary education, and earn more FFA grants. Ms. Poole has had more than \$4,000 awarded to 7th and 8th grade students in the form of SAE grants, FFA jacket scholarships, and FFA Camp scholarships.

CLEARY CONSTRUCTION KENTUCKY BUSINESS-EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP AWARD

Cleary Construction is an underground utility company in Tompkinsville, Kentucky. Currently, Cleary Construction supports career and technical education students in Monroe and Metcalfe Counties with the Cleary Academy, which is very similar to an internship for high school students. They also have an internship for college students, as well.

Students who participate in the Cleary Academy begin with thorough safety training and then have an opportunity to learn all aspects of the industry. Students are trained so they can begin working full-time after high school graduation. Cleary Construction is a valuable partner in all college and career fairs and senior mock job interviews. Furthermore, if a student desires to further his or her education, Cleary provides internship opportunities and supports earning postsecondary credentials.

BRIAN WELCH CARL PERKINS COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD

Brian Welch is an agriculture teacher in Hopkins County. Mr. Welch believes that true community service is not easily replicated, but instead fits the need of the time. He makes an intentional effort to ensure all of his students and classes have a direct tie to service-learning projects.

The projects range from washing emergency vehicles for first responders or washing dogs and creating adoption posters for animals at the Humane Society, to building wheelchair accessible raised garden beds for nursing homes during covid lock-down.

Mr. Welch's students build wooden toys that get donated to the local Salvation Army's Toys-for-Tots program and sheds for Habitat for Humanity homes. He has even led his students through the creation of a shipping container medical clinic for Liberia. Mr. Welch truly bridges the gap between his classroom and his community.

Ms. York also worked at the state level to develop and write curriculum for Culinary and Food Service, develop and write new curriculum for Food Science and Dietetics, and served at the state level to write and score materials for the Kentucky Occupational Skills Standard Assessment for Culinary

MARK LAMASTER CAREER AND TECHNICAL TEACHER OF THE YEAR

Mark Lamaster is a fire science teacher at Fern Creek High School in Louisville, Kentucky. Over the last five years under his direction, with strong support from his administration, the program has tripled in size.

Mr. Lamaster's main goal has been to make this as realistic and genuine as possible for his students. He connects with leaders from fire departments across our community to acquire resources such as surplus personal protective equipment and firefighting tools and equipment. In order to increase student engagement and provides a safe and realistic way to teach firefighting concepts, he implemented a virtual reality training system specifically designed for firefighting in his classroom.

Mr. Lamaster also has developed a strong partnership with the community. His students make weekly visits to the Fern Creek Fire Station, go to fire training facilities, and tour the local Emergency Management Agency and 911 call center. Mr. Lamaster works tirelessly to give his students the most real life experiences possible.

KACTE Award for Meritorious Service on Behalf of Career and Technical Education in Kentucky

Two of the Kentucky Association for Career and Technical Education (KACTE) purposes embodied in the organization's bylaws are to foster excellence in Career and Technical Education (CTE) in Kentucky, and to advocate for Kentucky and national policy to benefit CTE. These efforts have led, in part, to increased awareness by the Kentucky General Assembly of CTE's vital contributions to the Commonwealth's economy and workforce development. In 2022, the Association instituted KACTE's Award for Meritorious Service on Behalf of Career and Technical Education in Kentucky.

This discretionary Award is determined by the KACTE Advocacy Committee Chair and the KACTE officers based on individual contributions to enhancing the quality, equity and access of CTE in the state. In recognition of his championing the value of CTE, KACTE bestows the 2024 award to:

★ The Honorable Bobby McCool, Representative from District 97, Kentucky House of Representatives.

In the 2024 Kentucky General Assembly session, **Rep. McCool**, a retired CTE teacher and administrator, introduced House Bill 499 in the House of Representatives. The legislation codified the funding distribution method for secondary CTE in the state to equalize access and equity in CTE instruction for every CTE student. The legislation passed with wide support in both houses of the Kentucky General Assembly and was signed into law by Gov. Andy Beshear. His legislative initiatives continued the evolvement of CTE as a necessary and vibrant part of Kentucky's public education system.

KACTE Scholarships, Grants and Awards

The Kentucky Association for Career and Technical Education (KACTE) annually presents several scholarships, grants and awards. These programs are the professional association's continuing mission to support its membership and grow the profession of Career and Technical Education (CTE) teaching. Michael A. McMillen Student Teacher Scholarship

The Michael A. McMillen Student Teacher Scholarship honors Mike McMillen, a KACTE/ACTE life member who died unexpectedly while preparing to attend the 2013 Kentucky CTE Summer Program. He was an administrator with the Kentucky Community and Technical College System. During his service to his

profession, Mike was KACTE President and Treasurer. He held many committee positions at both the Kentucky and national levels.

The money may be used for any purpose, such as transportation, clothing or supplies. Donnalie Stratton Middle School Summer Program Stipends

The Donnalie Stratton Middle School Summer Program Stipends are named for Donnalie Stratton, who retired in 2014 after 62 years of service as both a family and consumer sciences classroom teacher and program consultant with the Kentucky Department of Education. Ms. Stratton died in 2016. She held several positions on the KACTE Board and was 2001 recipient of the ACTE Carl D. Perkins Humanitarian Award.

Middle School CTE teachers are not eligible to receive professional development reimbursement from Perkins Act funds. KACTE created the Middle School Summer Program Stipend to support professional development through attendance at the annual Kentucky CTE Summer Program.
